SAFE OCEAN

Not oceans and shores that do not have coastal hazards (i.e - Tsunami). is coastal area and ocean that is understood, observed, can be predicted, and where the people can continue to interact with the sea and oceans for their livelihood and lifestyle without having the fear of coastal hazards (tsunamis), as they already have the awareness, knowledge, preparedness, skills, and abilities to safe themselves in case of an emergency (tsunami)



Risk assessments, early warning system, public awareness, exercises, pre-planning, preparedness actions

SYSTEMATIC PREPAREDNESS

Aims to improve coastal community preparedness and ensures structural, systematic, and sustainable approach.



What is community?

- A community is a group of people who live in the same area (city, town, village, neighbourhood), includes its social and economic dimensions, its infrastructure, lifelines and supporting environmental systems.
- Scale of community is important. Its size (area, population), national governance structure, as well as its vulnerability, exposure, resources and capacity required, will determine how Tsunami Ready in implemented.

Tsunami Ready Indicators

Tsunami Ready consists of 12 key indicators designed to strengthen local tsunami risk reduction capacity. The indicators are grouped into three categories:

Assessment, Preparedness and Response

UNESCO IOC TSUNAMI READY INDICATORS ASSESSMENT (ASSESS) 1 ASSESS-1. Tsunami hazard zones are mapped and designated 2 ASSESS-2. The number of people at risk in the tsunami hazard zone is estimated 3 ASSESS-3. Economic, infrastructural, political, and social resources are identified PREPAREDNESS (PREP) 4 PREP-1. Easily understood tsunami evacuation maps are approved 5 PREP-2. Tsunami information including signage is publicly displayed 6 PREP-3. Outreach and public awareness and education resources are available and distributed 7 PREP-4. Outreach or educational activities are held at least three times a year 8 PREP-5: A community tsunami exercise is conducted at least every two years RESPONSE (RESP) 9 RESP-1. A community tsunami emergency response plan is approved 10 RESP-2. The capacity to manage emergency response operations during a tsunami is in place 11 RESP-3. Redundant and reliable means to timely receive 24-hour official tsunami alerts are in place 12 RESP-4. Redundant and reliable means to timely disseminate 24-hour official tsunami alerts to the public are in place





Why do you need Tsunami Ready ?

An advanced tsunami early warning system will not save lives if the community at risk does not have the knowledge and capacity to respond to the early warning.



- There is a high risk of loss of life and property in coastal communities with weak or no community preparedness for tsunami emergencies
- For local tsunamis*, the community needs to react and take action without official warning or guidance
- If the warning chain to the community is weak or broken, the community must be prepared to take action on its own initiative



* When a tsunami arrives in less than 1 hour from its source. Usually within a 100 – 200km range of the epicentre



Benefits of Tsunami Ready Programme

- Strengthens tsunami preparedness of coastal communities
 - Improved assessments of Hazards, Risk, Inundation, and Evacuation
 - Improved early warning systems/warning chain
 - Improved public awareness, understanding of tsunami threat and preparedness
 - Tests awareness and preparedness through regular exercises
- Strengthens the relationship between tsunami scientists and warning officials and local communities
- Strengthens preparedness for other hazards
- Improves community planning
- Encourages a **consistent and sustainable approach** to disaster risk reduction
- Contributes to the aims of the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction and Sustainable Development Goals
- International recognition from UNESCO IOC as Tsunami Ready Community
- Strengthens the relationship between tsunami scientists and warning officials and local communities






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Tsunami Ready Boardgame




